Understanding the Two Chicago Style Systems

The Chicago Manual of Style presents two distinct citation systems: the Notes-Bibliography system and the

Author-Date system. While both aim for clarity and accuracy, they differ in how in-text citations are handled and, consequently, how the final bibliography is structured. Selecting the appropriate system is often dictated by the academic discipline or the specific publication's requirements. Understanding these differences is the first step towards mastering Chicago manual bibliography creation.

The Notes-Bibliography System

This system is prevalent in humanities disciplines such as literature, history, and art. In-text citations are provided through footnotes or endnotes, indicated by superscript numbers within the text. The bibliography, listed at the end of the work, includes all sources cited in the notes, presented in a different format than the initial note. Each entry in the bibliography is typically single-spaced with a double space between entries, and the first line of each entry is flush left, with subsequent lines indented (a hanging indent).

The Author-Date System

Primarily used in the social sciences and natural sciences, the Author-Date system uses parenthetical in-text citations that include the author's last name and the publication year. For example, (Smith 2020). This system requires a corresponding reference list at the end of the work, which is alphabetically arranged by author's last name. The reference list entries are generally double-spaced, with no hanging indent, and the first line is flush left, followed by subsequent lines also flush left.

Core Principles of Chicago Bibliography

Regardless of which Chicago style system you employ, several core principles underpin effective bibliography creation. Adhering to these tenets ensures consistency, clarity, and completeness in your citation practices. These principles are the bedrock upon which all accurate Chicago manual bibliography creation is built.

Essential Bibliographical Elements

Every citation, whether in a note or a bibliography/reference list, requires specific pieces of information to adequately identify the source. The exact order and punctuation will vary between the two systems and source types, but the core components remain consistent:

- Author's name(s)
- Title of the work
- Publication information (publisher, place of publication, year)
- For articles: journal title, volume, issue, page numbers, and date
- For online sources: URL and access date

Accuracy and Consistency

The cardinal rule of any bibliography is accuracy. Double-check all names, titles, dates, and page numbers. Consistency in formatting is equally vital. If you choose to italicize book titles, do so for every book. If you abbreviate journal titles, maintain that abbreviation throughout. Inconsistent formatting can distract readers and undermine the credibility of your work. Strict adherence to the chosen Chicago manual bibliography creation guidelines is paramount.

Alphabetical or Chronological Order

In the Notes-Bibliography system, the bibliography is arranged alphabetically by the author's last name. In the Author-Date system, the reference list is also arranged alphabetically. However, if citing multiple works by the same author, chronological order within that author's entries is often preferred, with the earliest work listed first.

Crafting Entries for Books

Books are a staple in academic research, and mastering their citation in Chicago style is essential. The format for books differs slightly between the Notes-Bibliography and Author-Date systems.

Notes-Bibliography System: Book Citations

A typical note citation for a book might look like this:

1. John Smith, *The History of Chicago* (Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 2020), 45.

The corresponding bibliography entry would be:

Smith, John. *The History of Chicago*. Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 2020.

Notice the inversion of the author's name (last name first) and the punctuation differences. The bibliography entry is single-spaced with a hanging indent.

Author-Date System: Book Citations

In the Author-Date system, the in-text citation is:

(Smith 2020, 45).

The corresponding reference list entry would be:

Smith, John. 2020. *The History of Chicago*. Chicago: University of Chicago Press.

The year appears immediately after the author's name, and the entry is generally double-spaced with no hanging indent.

Multiple Authors and Editors

For books with multiple authors, list all authors in the bibliography/reference list in the order they appear on the title page. The first author's name is inverted. If a book has editors instead of authors, use the editor's name followed by "ed." or "eds.".

Citing Journal Articles

Journal articles are another frequently used source type. Their citation requires more detailed information due to their specific publication within volumes and issues.

Notes-Bibliography System: Journal Articles

A typical note citation for a journal article:

2. Jane Doe, "The Impact of Technology on Education," *Journal of Modern Learning* 15, no. 2 (Spring 2021): 112.

The corresponding bibliography entry:

Doe, Jane. "The Impact of Technology on Education." *Journal of Modern Learning* 15, no. 2 (Spring 2021): 105–25.

Note the inclusion of the article title in quotation marks, the journal title italicized, and the volume, issue, and page numbers.

Author-Date System: Journal Articles

In-text citation:

(Doe 2021, 112).

Reference list entry:

Doe, Jane. 2021. "The Impact of Technology on Education." *Journal of Modern Learning* 15, no. 2 (Spring): 105–25.

The year immediately follows the author's name.

Referencing Websites and Online Sources

The digital age has expanded the types of sources available. Citing online materials requires careful attention to detail, especially regarding accessibility and publication dates.

Notes-Bibliography System: Websites

For a webpage, the note might include:

3. "About Us," Example Corporation, accessed October 26, 2023, <https://www.example.com/about>.

The bibliography entry:

"About Us." Example Corporation. Accessed October 26, 2023. <https://www.example.com/about>.

It's important to include the access date, as online content can change.

Author-Date System: Websites

In-text citation:

(Example Corporation, n.d.).

Reference list entry:

Example Corporation. n.d. "About Us." Accessed October 26, 2023. <https://www.example.com/about>.

"n.d." stands for "no date," if a publication date is not available.

Online Books and Articles

If you access a book or article online that also exists in print, you generally cite it as if it were a print source and then include the URL and access date. If it's an online-only publication, follow the guidelines for websites, but include as much publication information as possible.

Handling Other Common Source Types

Beyond books and articles, a robust bibliography may include a variety of other sources, each with its specific formatting requirements within the Chicago manual bibliography creation framework.

Citing Newspapers and Magazines

Similar to journal articles, newspaper and magazine citations include the publication date and page numbers. For the Notes-Bibliography system:

4. Michael Chen, "Local Election Results," *Chicago Tribune*, October 25, 2023, sec. A, p. 5.

Bibliography entry:

Chen, Michael. "Local Election Results." *Chicago Tribune*, October 25, 2023.

For the Author-Date system, the year would follow the author's name.

Referencing Dissertations and Theses

Dissertations and theses are often cited with information about the institution and the year of degree conferral. For the Notes-Bibliography system:

5. Sarah Lee, "The Evolution of Urban Planning" (PhD diss., University of Chicago, 2022), 88.

Bibliography entry:

Lee, Sarah. "The Evolution of Urban Planning." PhD diss., University of Chicago, 2022.

Audiovisual Materials

For films, videos, or podcasts, include the director/creator, title, and publication/distribution information. For the Notes-Bibliography system:

6. *The Great Documentary*, directed by Anna Garcia (New York: Film Productions Inc., 2019).

Bibliography entry:

The Great Documentary. Directed by Anna Garcia. New York: Film Productions Inc., 2019.

Formatting Your Bibliography Page

The physical presentation of your bibliography or reference list is as important as the content of the entries themselves. Proper formatting ensures readability and adherence to Chicago style guidelines.

Page Heading

The page should be headed either "Bibliography" (for the Notes-Bibliography system) or "Reference List" (for the Author-Date system). This heading should be centered at the top of the page.

Spacing and Indentation

For the Notes-Bibliography system, entries are typically single-spaced within the entry and double-spaced between entries. A hanging indent is used, where the first line is flush left and subsequent lines are indented. The Author-Date system usually calls for double-spacing throughout the entire reference list, with no hanging indent. All lines are flush left.

Alphabetical Arrangement

Ensure all entries are meticulously alphabetized by the author's last name. If citing works by the same author, arrange them chronologically by publication year, earliest first.

Common Pitfalls in Chicago Bibliography

Even with careful attention, certain mistakes are common when creating bibliographies. Being aware of these can help you avoid them.

Inconsistent Formatting

Failing to maintain consistency in punctuation, capitalization, or the use of italics is a frequent error. Always refer back to the CMOS or your style guide.

Missing Essential Information

Forgetting crucial details like the publication year, page numbers, or publisher can render a citation incomplete and unhelpful. Thoroughness is key to accurate Chicago manual bibliography creation.

Incorrect Author Inversion

Remember that only the first author's last name is inverted in the bibliography/reference list. Subsequent authors are listed in normal order (first name first).

Omission of Accessed Dates for Online Sources

Because web content can change or disappear, including the date you accessed an online source is a vital part of its citation.

Mismatched In-Text Citations and Bibliography Entries

Ensure that every source cited in your text has a corresponding entry in your bibliography, and vice versa. The information in both must also align.

Q: What is the correct order for entries in a Chicago style bibliography?

A: Entries in a Chicago style bibliography should be arranged alphabetically by the author's last name. If you have multiple works by the same author, list them chronologically by publication year, with the earliest work appearing first.
