# CMOS Citation Basics for Books

Before delving into the specifics of epilogues, it's essential to grasp the fundamental principles of citing books in The Chicago Manual of Style. CMOS employs two distinct citation systems: the NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY system and the AUTHOR-DATE system. This article will primarily focus on the NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY system, which is more common in the humanities, as it directly addresses the nuances of referencing specific textual elements through notes.

In the NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY system, a citation begins with a note (footnote or endnote) and is followed by a full entry in the bibliography. The note provides a precise location of the information being cited, while the bibliography offers a comprehensive list of all sources consulted. Both notes and bibliography entries follow a standardized format, which includes author, title, publication details, and page numbers.

Key elements for a basic book citation in CMOS notes include the author's name (first name first), the title of the book (*italicized*), publication information (city, publisher, year), and the specific page number(s). The bibliography entry generally follows a similar order but may present the author's name last name first for alphabetization and may omit page numbers for a general reference to the work.

## Citing Books with Epilogues in Footnotes and Endnotes

It is important to distinguish between citing the epilogue as a whole and citing specific pages within it. ## Citing the Epilogue as a Whole

## Citing Books with Epilogues in Bibliographies

The bibliography entry for a book containing an epilogue generally mirrors the standard book citation format. The Chicago Manual of Style does not typically require a separate entry for the epilogue itself in the bibliography unless it is a separately published work or a significant standalone piece within a collection. Instead, the epilogue is considered part of the overall book.

The main bibliography entry for the book will list the author, the title of the book, and the publication details. For example, a standard bibliography

entry would be: Smith, John. The Last Chapter. New York: Fictional Press, 2023.

When you have cited the epilogue in your notes, the reader will refer to the bibliography entry for the full details of the book. The note itself has already specified that the referenced material is from the epilogue. ## Epilogues with Distinct Titles

In such cases, the title of the epilogue should be included in the citation, enclosed in quotation marks, following the book title and publication details, and preceding the page number. For example: "Jane Doe, *A New Dawn* (London: Literary House, 2022), 'The Future Unfolds,' 250."

This approach ensures that the reader can precisely locate the referenced material, especially if the epilogue has a unique thematic title that distinguishes it from the main narrative. It adds an extra layer of clarity to your citation.

## Epilogues in Edited Collections

Citing an epilogue within an edited collection requires careful attention to the structure of the citation. If the epilogue is part of a larger work within the collection (e.g., a short story with an epilogue), you would cite it as you would any other part of that work, noting the epilogue within the specific story's citation. If the epilogue is a standalone piece at the end of the entire collection, it would be cited as a distinct contribution, often with its author and title, followed by the collection's details.

It's important to distinguish an epilogue from an afterword or a postscript, as their citation and content can differ. An epilogue is typically a narrative extension that takes place after the main story's conclusion. An afterword, on the other hand, is usually a commentary written by the author or an editor reflecting on the work, its creation, or its themes. A postscript (P.S.) is a note added after the main body of a letter or document.

When citing an afterword, you would typically refer to it as such. For example: "John Smith, *The Last Chapter*, 'Afterword,' 261." The bibliography entry would remain for the main book. Citations for postscripts are less common in academic works unless the primary source itself is a letter or a document that includes one.

## **Citing Non-Fiction Books with Epilogues**
