Understanding Chicago Style: Notes-Bibliography vs. Author-Date

The Chicago Manual of Style (CMOS) offers two primary citation systems: the notes-bibliography system and the author-date system. Citing Books with Two Authors

When a book is co-authored by two individuals, the Chicago Manual of Style requires that both authors' names be included in the citation. The order of the names should match their appearance on the title page of the book. This consistency is vital for accurate source identification.

Notes-Bibliography System for Two Authors

In the notes-bibliography system, the first note for a book with two authors will typically include both names, followed by the book title, publication information, and page number if applicable. Subsequent notes referencing the same work can be shortened. The bibliography entry will also list both authors in the same order as on the title page.

Citing Books with Three or Four Authors

Notes-Bibliography System for Three or Four Authors

For the first note or citation, all authors should be listed. However, for subsequent notes, the first author's last name is followed by "et al." This abbreviation, meaning "and others," is a standard practice to avoid excessive length in notes.

Author-Date System for Three or Four Authors

Citing Books with Five or More Authors

Notes-Bibliography System for Five or More Authors

For books with a large number of authors, you will list the first author's last name followed by "et al." in both the initial note and any subsequent notes. Similarly, in the author-date system, the in-text citation for works with five or more authors will always use "et al." following the first author's last name. The reference list will list all authors, just as in the notes-bibliography system, ensuring complete attribution.

Citing Edited Books with Multiple Editors

Edited books present a unique challenge because they feature editors rather than authors in the primary authorship position. The way you cite them depends on whether the editors are responsible for the entire work or if you are citing a specific chapter within the edited volume, which would then involve the chapter author.

Notes-Bibliography System for Edited Books

When citing the entire edited book, you will list the editors. If there are two editors, both are listed. For three or more editors, you list the first editor followed by "et al." in the notes, but all editors are listed in the bibliography.

Author-Date System for Edited Books

In the author-date system, the in-text citation for an edited book will typically include the first editor's last name and the year. The reference list will list all editors.
