Citing a Book with a Standard Preface

When a book's preface is written by the same author as the main work, the citation primarily focuses on the book itself. The preface is considered part of the book's overall structure. In the notes-bibliography system, the initial footnote or endnote will typically include the author's full name, the title of the book (italicized), and the publication details (city, publisher, year), followed by the page number of the preface if you are referencing a specific passage within it. Citing a Book with a Preface by a Different Contributor

Bibliography Entry Format

The bibliography entry will mirror the structure of the footnote but will be alphabetized by the preface author's last name. The format generally prioritizes the preface author's contribution. The entry would be structured as follows:

Smith, John. Preface to Literary Analysis, by Jane Doe. ix-xiv. Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 2023.

Again, the page numbers are included if they refer to a specific section being cited. If the preface is not specially titled, you simply use "Preface" and the main book title. The crucial element here is clearly separating the preface author's name and their role from the main author and the book title.

When the Preface Author is Also the Book Author

The footnote or endnote will start with the author's name, the book title, and publication information, followed by the page number if a specific passage from the preface is being referenced. There is no need to explicitly mention "preface by" or list the author's name twice. For instance:

The bibliography entry remains straightforward: "Doe, Jane. *The Art of Citation*. Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 2023." The preface is understood to be part of the author's work.

Handling Prefaces in Translated Works

When citing a translated work that includes a preface, the attribution needs to be precise. Typically, the preface author is acknowledged first, followed by the translator and the original author. If the preface is by someone other than the original author or translator, their role must be specified. For example, if an academic wrote a preface for a translated novel:

Citing Prefaces in Edited Collections

For edited collections, a preface might be written by the editor(s) or a distinguished contributor. If the preface is by the editor, you would cite it as such, followed by the title of the collection and the editor's name. If a separate author wrote a preface to the collection, their name and role would precede the collection's title and editor.

For a preface written by an editor:

4. Michael Chen, preface to *Essays on Modern Literature*, edited by Michael Chen, 1-5.

For a preface written by a contributor to an edited collection:

5. Emily Carter, preface to *Modern Literary Theory*, edited by John Davis, ix-xv.

The bibliography entries would follow the same principle, clearly delineating the preface author and their connection to the edited volume.
