Understanding the Preface in Book Citations

CMOS Citation Styles for Books with Prefaces

First Note for a Preface

The initial citation for a preface in a footnote or endnote will include the author of the preface (if applicable), the title of the preface, and then the full bibliographic details of the book. If the preface is not individually titled, it is often referred to simply as "Preface."

For a preface written by the main author:

- Author's Full Name, "Preface," in Book Title, by Author of Book, page numbers. Publisher, Year of Publication.

For a preface written by someone else:

- Author of Preface's Full Name, "Preface Title" (or "Preface"), in Book Title, by Author of Book, page numbers. Publisher, Year of Publication.

For example:

- Jane Doe, "A Word from the Author," in *The Art of Reading*, by John Smith, ix-xv. Acclaimed Press, 2023.

Subsequent Notes for a Preface

Once a source has been fully cited, subsequent references in footnotes or endnotes can be

shortened. This typically includes the author's last name, a shortened title (if necessary to distinguish it from other works by the same author), and the page number(s).

Example of a subsequent note:

- Doe, "A Word from the Author," 45.

If you are referring to the preface again, and it is short, you might simply cite:

- Smith, Preface, 12.

Author-Date Citations for Prefaces

The author-date system, more common in the social sciences and sciences, uses parenthetical in-text citations and a reference list at the end of the work. Citing a preface within this system requires clear indication of the source material and the specific location within it.

In-Text Citations

In the author-date system, an in-text citation typically includes the author's last name and the year of publication. When citing a specific part of the book, like a preface, you will also include the relevant page number.

Example:

Reference List Entry

The reference list at the end of your document will contain a full bibliographic entry for each source cited. For a book with a preface, the entry will generally follow the standard book format, with specific attention given to identifying the preface.

Example for a preface by the main author:

- Smith, John. 2023. The Art of Reading. Acclaimed Press.

To specifically acknowledge the preface, and especially if it has a distinct title or author, the reference list entry might be adjusted or the in-text citation would need to be very specific. However, CMOS generally focuses on the book as the primary source, with the preface being a section within it. If a separate author wrote the preface, this would be noted in the full footnote/endnote citation, and sometimes in a more detailed reference list entry if the

structure allows or requires it for clarity.

Citing Prefaces by Different Authors

A common scenario is when a book's preface is written by someone other than the main author. This is often the case for introductions, forewords, or special dedications. The Chicago Manual of Style requires that you clearly identify the author of the preface in your citation.

In the note-bibliography system, the author of the preface is listed first in the note, followed by the title of the preface (if any), and then the details of the main book. This clearly distinguishes the contributor. For instance, a preface by a renowned scholar introducing a classic text would be attributed to that scholar, not the original author of the classic.

In the author-date system, the in-text citation would typically refer to the author of the preface if that is who you are quoting or referencing directly. The reference list entry should also reflect the authorship of the preface if it is treated as a significant introductory component that needs explicit attribution beyond the main author. However, often the primary author of the book is listed in the reference list, with the preface information being contained within the full note. The precise presentation can vary based on how much emphasis the preface carries in your discussion.

This meticulous approach elevates fan engagement from casual appreciation to informed analysis.

The process of citing a preface allows you to:

- Attribute specific authorial intentions or contexts that enhance your understanding.
- Support your interpretations with direct evidence from the author's own words.

- Demonstrate a thorough engagement with the entire published work, including its introductory materials.
- Contribute to a more informed and nuanced discussion within your fandom or academic community.

Best Practices for Accurate Preface Citation

Regardless of whether you are using footnotes or the author-date system, certain best practices will ensure your citations of book prefaces are accurate and professional. Consistency is key; once you choose a system, adhere to it throughout your work. Double-checking all details against the actual book is also critical, as small errors can lead to confusion or misattribution.

Always pay close attention to the exact wording and punctuation as prescribed by the Chicago Manual of Style. If a preface has a specific title (e.g., "Author's Note," "Foreword"), use that title accurately. If it is simply designated as "Preface," then use that designation. Ensure that page numbers are correct and reflect the specific edition of the book you consulted. For fans who might be referencing multiple editions or versions of a text, clearly stating which edition is being cited is vital. This level of detail not only satisfies academic rigor but also honors the source material with the respect it deserves.

Remember that the preface is an integral part of the book's overall presentation, and its accurate citation contributes to the integrity and credibility of your own writing, whether it's a formal academic paper or a deeply researched fan analysis.

Q: How do I cite a preface in Chicago style if I'm only quoting the first few sentences?

A: You would still cite the preface using the standard Chicago Manual of Style format for footnotes/endnotes or author-date, including the specific page number(s) from which you are quoting. For example, in a footnote, it might look like: Jane Doe, "Preface," in *The Art of Reading*, by John Smith, ix. Acclaimed Press, 2023.
