UNDERSTANDING CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE FOR CHARTS

CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR DATE FOR CHART CITATION IS A CRUCIAL ELEMENT FOR ACADEMIC AND PROFESSIONAL INTEGRITY, ENSURING PROPER ATTRIBUTION FOR VISUAL DATA. THIS METHOD, COMMONLY EMPLOYED IN MANY FIELDS, REQUIRES A PRECISE APPROACH TO REFERENCING ANY CHART, GRAPH, TABLE, OR INFOGRAPHIC USED WITHIN A DOCUMENT. ACCURATELY CITING YOUR SOURCES NOT ONLY PREVENTS PLAGIARISM BUT ALSO ALLOWS YOUR READERS TO LOCATE THE ORIGINAL DATA, FOSTERING TRANSPARENCY AND CREDIBILITY. THIS ARTICLE WILL DELVE INTO THE INTRICACIES OF IMPLEMENTING THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE'S AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM FOR VARIOUS VISUAL REPRESENTATIONS, COVERING EVERYTHING FROM IN-TEXT CITATIONS TO COMPREHENSIVE BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRIES. WE WILL EXPLORE THE SPECIFIC COMPONENTS REQUIRED FOR A CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE CHART CITATION, THE NUANCES OF DIFFERENT CHART TYPES, AND BEST PRACTICES FOR SEAMLESS INTEGRATION INTO YOUR WRITTEN WORK. UNDERSTANDING THESE GUIDELINES IS ESSENTIAL FOR ANYONE SEEKING TO PUBLISH OR PRESENT RESEARCH, ACADEMIC PAPERS, OR REPORTS THAT INCORPORATE VISUAL DATA.

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THE CORE COMPONENTS OF A CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE CHART CITATION

WHEN EMPLOYING THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE'S AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM FOR REFERENCING CHARTS, A STANDARDIZED SET OF INFORMATION IS REQUIRED TO CREATE BOTH IN-TEXT CITATIONS AND FULL BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRIES. THIS ENSURES THAT READERS CAN EASILY IDENTIFY THE SOURCE AND ITS ORIGIN. THE FUNDAMENTAL ELEMENTS REVOLVE AROUND IDENTIFYING THE CREATOR OF THE DATA AND THE PUBLICATION OR ORIGIN OF THE CHART ITSELF.

ESSENTIAL INFORMATION FOR CITATION

REGARDLESS OF THE SPECIFIC TYPE OF CHART OR GRAPH, CERTAIN PIECES OF INFORMATION ARE INDISPENSABLE FOR A CHICAGO

STYLE AUTHOR-DATE CITATION. THESE CORE COMPONENTS FORM THE BACKBONE OF ACCURATE REFERENCING.

- **AUTHOR(S) OR CREATOR(S):** THIS REFERS TO THE INDIVIDUAL OR ORGANIZATION RESPONSIBLE FOR GENERATING THE DATA PRESENTED IN THE CHART.
- **YEAR OF PUBLICATION/CREATION:** THIS IS THE YEAR THE SOURCE CONTAINING THE CHART WAS PUBLISHED OR THE CHART ITSELF WAS CREATED.
- **TITLE OF THE CHART OR SOURCE:** IF THE CHART HAS A SPECIFIC TITLE, IT SHOULD BE INCLUDED. OTHERWISE, THE TITLE OF THE LARGER WORK IN WHICH THE CHART APPEARS IS USED.
- **PUBLICATION DETAILS:** THIS INCLUDES INFORMATION SUCH AS THE JOURNAL NAME, BOOK TITLE, WEBSITE URL, OR REPORT SERIES, ALONG WITH ANY RELEVANT PAGE NUMBERS OR ACCESS DATES.

DISTINGUISHING DATA CREATOR FROM PUBLISHER

A CRUCIAL DISTINCTION IN CHICAGO STYLE, PARTICULARLY FOR CHARTS, IS BETWEEN THE CREATOR OF THE DATA AND THE PUBLISHER OF THE WORK WHERE THE CHART IS FOUND. FOR INSTANCE, A GOVERNMENT AGENCY MIGHT COLLECT AND PRESENT DATA IN A REPORT, AND THAT REPORT IS THEN PUBLISHED BY A UNIVERSITY PRESS. THE CITATION MUST REFLECT BOTH.

THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM PRIORITIZES THE ENTITY THAT ORIGINALLY PRODUCED THE INFORMATION. IF THE CHART IS FROM A BOOK, THE AUTHOR OF THE BOOK IS TYPICALLY CITED. IF IT'S FROM A JOURNAL ARTICLE, THE AUTHOR OF THE ARTICLE IS USED. FOR CHARTS THAT ARE PART OF A WEBSITE OR A CORPORATE REPORT, THE ORGANIZATION OR AUTHOR LISTED AS RESPONSIBLE FOR THE CONTENT TAKES PRECEDENCE.

IN-TEXT CITATIONS FOR CHARTS IN CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE

IN-TEXT CITATIONS SERVE AS BRIEF POINTERS WITHIN THE BODY OF YOUR TEXT, DIRECTING READERS TO THE FULL BIBLIOGRAPHIC ENTRY FOR A CITED SOURCE. FOR CHARTS, THESE CITATIONS ARE CRITICAL FOR ATTRIBUTING THE VISUAL INFORMATION DIRECTLY TO ITS ORIGIN.

PLACEMENT OF IN-TEXT CITATIONS

THE IN-TEXT CITATION FOR A CHART SHOULD GENERALLY BE PLACED IMMEDIATELY AFTER THE CHART IS MENTIONED OR PRESENTED IN THE TEXT, OR AT THE END OF THE SENTENCE OR PARAGRAPH THAT REFERS TO THE CHART'S DATA. THE GOAL IS TO CLEARLY LINK THE INFORMATION BEING DISCUSSED TO ITS SOURCE.

WHEN A CHART IS PRESENTED AS A STANDALONE FIGURE WITHIN YOUR DOCUMENT, THE IN-TEXT CITATION TYPICALLY APPEARS IN THE CAPTION OR IN A NOTE ASSOCIATED WITH THE FIGURE. THIS ALLOWS FOR A DIRECT AND IMMEDIATE CONNECTION BETWEEN THE VISUAL ELEMENT AND ITS SOURCE INFORMATION.

FORMATTING THE PARENTHETICAL CITATION

THE STANDARD FORMAT FOR AN IN-TEXT CITATION IN CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE IS (AUTHOR YEAR, PAGE NUMBER). HOWEVER, WHEN REFERENCING A CHART THAT IS EMBEDDED WITHIN A LARGER WORK, THE PAGE NUMBER IS OFTEN OMITTED IF THE

CHART ITSELF IS CLEARLY LABELED AS A FIGURE AND ITS PLACEMENT IS EVIDENT. THE MOST COMMON FORMAT IS SIMPLY (AUTHOR YEAR).

FOR EXAMPLE, IF YOU ARE DISCUSSING DATA PRESENTED IN A CHART CREATED BY SMITH IN 2022, AND THIS CHART IS PART OF A BOOK CHAPTER OR REPORT, YOUR IN-TEXT CITATION MIGHT LOOK LIKE THIS: (SMITH 2022). IF THE CHART IS A STANDALONE FIGURE WITHIN YOUR DOCUMENT, AND THE ORIGINAL SOURCE IS A REPORT, YOU MIGHT CITE IT AS (GOVERNMENT AGENCY 2021, FIG. 3), ASSUMING "FIG. 3" IS HOW THE CHART IS IDENTIFIED IN ITS ORIGINAL PUBLICATION.

CITING ENTIRE CHARTS VS. SPECIFIC DATA POINTS

IT'S IMPORTANT TO DIFFERENTIATE BETWEEN CITING AN ENTIRE CHART AND CITING SPECIFIC DATA POINTS DERIVED FROM THAT CHART. IF YOU ARE REFERRING TO THE OVERALL TRENDS OR INFORMATION PRESENTED IN A CHART, A GENERAL CITATION MIGHT SUFFICE. HOWEVER, IF YOU ARE QUOTING A SPECIFIC STATISTIC OR DATA POINT FROM THE CHART, YOU SHOULD ENDEAVOR TO PROVIDE AS PRECISE A REFERENCE AS POSSIBLE, WHICH MAY INCLUDE A PAGE NUMBER OR FIGURE NUMBER IF AVAILABLE IN THE ORIGINAL SOURCE.

BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRIES FOR CHARTS USING CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE

THE BIBLIOGRAPHY, OR REFERENCE LIST, PROVIDES THE COMPLETE BIBLIOGRAPHIC INFORMATION FOR ALL SOURCES CITED IN YOUR WORK. FOR CHARTS, THESE ENTRIES MUST BE THOROUGH AND FOLLOW SPECIFIC FORMATTING RULES WITHIN THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE AUTHOR-DATE FRAMEWORK.

STRUCTURE OF A BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRY

A STANDARD BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRY FOR A CHART WILL TYPICALLY INCLUDE THE AUTHOR(S), YEAR OF PUBLICATION, TITLE OF THE CHART (IF APPLICABLE) OR THE WORK IT APPEARS IN, AND PUBLICATION DETAILS. THE SPECIFIC ORDER AND PUNCTUATION DEPEND ON THE NATURE OF THE SOURCE MATERIAL.

FOR CHARTS IN BOOKS

WHEN A CHART APPEARS WITHIN A BOOK, THE CITATION GENERALLY FOLLOWS THE FORMAT FOR CITING A CHAPTER OR A SPECIFIC PART OF A BOOK. THE AUTHOR OF THE BOOK IS LISTED, FOLLOWED BY THE YEAR, THE BOOK TITLE, AND PUBLICATION INFORMATION. IF THE CHART IS A PROMINENT, TITLED FIGURE, THAT TITLE MAY BE INCLUDED.

EXAMPLE FOR A CHART WITHIN A BOOK:

- SMITH, JOHN. 2022. *THE STATE OF MODERN DATA*. CHICAGO: UNIVERSITY OF CHICAGO PRESS. CHART 3.2.

IN THIS EXAMPLE, "CHART 3.2" INDICATES THE SPECIFIC LOCATION OF THE CHART WITHIN THE BOOK.

FOR CHARTS IN JOURNAL ARTICLES

CHARTS FOUND WITHIN ACADEMIC JOURNAL ARTICLES ARE CITED USING THE STANDARD JOURNAL ARTICLE FORMAT, WITH THE AUTHOR OF THE ARTICLE AND THE YEAR BEING PARAMOUNT. THE JOURNAL TITLE, VOLUME, ISSUE, AND PAGE NUMBERS ARE ALSO CRUCIAL.

EXAMPLE FOR A CHART WITHIN A JOURNAL ARTICLE:

- JONES, EMILY, AND DAVID LEE. 2021. "TRENDS IN RENEWABLE ENERGY CONSUMPTION." *JOURNAL OF ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES* 45 (3): 115–130. FIGURE 4.

HERE, "FIGURE 4" REFERS TO THE SPECIFIC CHART WITHIN THE JOURNAL ARTICLE.

FOR CHARTS ON WEBSITES

CITING CHARTS FROM WEBSITES REQUIRES CAREFUL ATTENTION TO THE INFORMATION AVAILABLE. THE AUTHOR (INDIVIDUAL OR ORGANIZATION) AND THE YEAR ARE ESSENTIAL. THE TITLE OF THE PAGE OR THE CHART ITSELF, THE WEBSITE NAME, AND THE URL ARE ALSO INCLUDED, ALONG WITH AN ACCESS DATE.

EXAMPLE FOR A CHART ON A WEBSITE:

- WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION. 2023. "GLOBAL VACCINATION RATES." ACCESSED OCTOBER 26, 2023.
[HTTPS://WWW.WHO.INT/DATA/CHARTS/GLOBAL-VACCINATION-RATES](https://www.who.int/data/charts/global-vaccination-rates).

IF THE CHART HAS A SPECIFIC TITLE, IT WOULD BE INCLUDED AFTER THE ORGANIZATION NAME AND BEFORE THE PUBLICATION YEAR OR ACCESS DATE.

SPECIFIC CONSIDERATIONS FOR DIFFERENT CHART TYPES

WHILE THE GENERAL PRINCIPLES OF CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE CITATION FOR CHARTS REMAIN CONSISTENT, NUANCES CAN ARISE DEPENDING ON THE SPECIFIC TYPE OF VISUAL REPRESENTATION. UNDERSTANDING THESE DISTINCTIONS ENSURES ACCURACY AND CLARITY IN YOUR CITATIONS.

GRAPHS AND DIAGRAMS

GRAPHS, WHETHER BAR CHARTS, LINE GRAPHS, OR PIE CHARTS, AND DIAGRAMS OFTEN PRESENT STATISTICAL DATA OR ILLUSTRATE RELATIONSHIPS. THE AUTHOR AND YEAR OF THE SOURCE MATERIAL ARE THE PRIMARY CITATION ELEMENTS. IF THE GRAPH ITSELF HAS A TITLE DISTINCT FROM THE SURROUNDING TEXT, THAT TITLE SHOULD BE INCLUDED IN THE CITATION, ESPECIALLY FOR STANDALONE FIGURES.

FOR A COMPLEX DIAGRAM THAT ILLUSTRATES A PROCESS, THE FOCUS OF THE CITATION WILL BE ON THE ORIGIN OF THE DIAGRAM AND ITS CONCEPTUAL SOURCE. THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM WILL PRIORITIZE THE CREATOR OF THE INTELLECTUAL CONTENT BEING DEPICTED.

TABLES AND INFOGRAPHICS

TABLES THAT PRESENT NUMERICAL DATA REQUIRE SIMILAR CITATION PRACTICES TO GRAPHS. THE AUTHOR AND YEAR OF THE SOURCE ARE KEY. IF THE TABLE HAS A SPECIFIC HEADING, IT SHOULD BE REFERENCED. FOR INFOGRAPHICS, WHICH OFTEN COMBINE DATA VISUALIZATION WITH DESIGN ELEMENTS, THE CITATION SHOULD FOCUS ON THE SOURCE OF THE DATA AND THE CREATOR OF THE INFOGRAPHIC, IF DISTINGUISHABLE.

WHEN CITING AN INFOGRAPHIC, IT IS IMPORTANT TO CONSIDER WHETHER IT IS A STANDALONE PIECE OR PART OF A LARGER

PUBLICATION. THE ORIGINAL SOURCE, WHETHER A WEBSITE, REPORT, OR ARTICLE, WILL DICTATE THE FORMAT OF THE BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRY.

MAPS AND CARTOGRAPHIC DATA

MAPS, PARTICULARLY THOSE PRESENTING STATISTICAL DATA (E.G., POPULATION DENSITY MAPS), SHOULD BE CITED BY THE CARTOGRAPHER OR THE ORIGINATING INSTITUTION, ALONG WITH THE YEAR OF PUBLICATION. THE TITLE OF THE MAP AND THE ATLAS OR PUBLICATION IT IS FOUND IN ARE ALSO CRITICAL. IF THE MAP IS FROM AN ONLINE MAPPING SERVICE, THE SERVICE'S NAME, THE DATE ACCESSED, AND THE URL ARE NECESSARY.

PLACEMENT AND FORMATTING OF CHARTS WITH CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE

BEYOND THE CITATION ITSELF, THE PROPER PLACEMENT AND FORMATTING OF CHARTS WITHIN YOUR DOCUMENT ARE CRUCIAL FOR BOTH READABILITY AND ADHERENCE TO ACADEMIC STANDARDS, ESPECIALLY WHEN USING THE CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM.

NUMBERING AND TITLING CHARTS

ALL CHARTS, GRAPHS, TABLES, AND OTHER FIGURES SHOULD BE NUMBERED CONSECUTIVELY WITHIN YOUR DOCUMENT (E.G., FIGURE 1, FIGURE 2, TABLE 1, TABLE 2). EACH FIGURE SHOULD HAVE A DESCRIPTIVE TITLE THAT CLEARLY INDICATES ITS CONTENT. THIS NUMBERING AND TITLING SYSTEM IS ESSENTIAL FOR CREATING BOTH THE IN-TEXT CITATIONS AND THE LIST OF FIGURES OR TABLES THAT MAY PRECEDE OR FOLLOW YOUR MAIN TEXT.

CAPTIONING CHARTS

BENEATH EACH NUMBERED AND TITLED CHART, A CAPTION SHOULD BE PROVIDED. THE CAPTION SERVES AS A BRIEF EXPLANATION OF THE CHART'S CONTENT AND, IMPORTANTLY, INCLUDES THE IN-TEXT CITATION TO THE ORIGINAL SOURCE USING THE CHICAGO AUTHOR-DATE FORMAT. THIS DIRECT ASSOCIATION ENSURES THAT THE READER CAN IMMEDIATELY IDENTIFY WHERE THE DATA ORIGINATED.

A TYPICAL CAPTION MIGHT READ:

- FIGURE 1. GLOBAL AVERAGE TEMPERATURE ANOMALY, 1900-2020 (NASA GISS 2021).

THE PARENTHETICAL CITATION (NASA GISS 2021) DIRECTLY FOLLOWS THE DESCRIPTIVE CAPTION.

PLACEMENT WITHIN THE DOCUMENT

IDEALLY, CHARTS SHOULD BE PLACED AS CLOSE AS POSSIBLE TO THE TEXT THAT DISCUSSES THEM. IF A CHART IS TOO LARGE TO FIT ON A SINGLE PAGE, IT CAN BE PLACED ON THE SUBSEQUENT PAGE, WITH A CLEAR INDICATION IN THE PRECEDING TEXT THAT THE FIGURE FOLLOWS. WHEN EMBEDDING CHARTS THAT ARE REPRODUCED FROM EXTERNAL SOURCES, ENSURE THAT THEY ARE CLEARLY DISTINGUISHED FROM YOUR OWN ORIGINAL CONTENT THROUGH THE CITATION AND CAPTIONING PROCESS.

COMMON PITFALLS AND HOW TO AVOID THEM

NAVIGATING THE COMPLEXITIES OF CITATION CAN LEAD TO ERRORS. AWARENESS OF COMMON MISTAKES IN CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE CHART CITATION CAN HELP ENSURE ACCURACY AND MAINTAIN ACADEMIC INTEGRITY.

INCONSISTENT CITATION FORMAT

A FREQUENT ERROR IS THE INCONSISTENT APPLICATION OF THE AUTHOR-DATE FORMAT. THIS CAN MANIFEST AS VARIATIONS IN PUNCTUATION, CAPITALIZATION, OR THE INCLUSION/EXCLUSION OF NECESSARY ELEMENTS LIKE THE YEAR OR AUTHOR'S NAME.

TO AVOID THIS, MAINTAIN A STYLE SHEET OR A MASTER LIST OF ALL CITED SOURCES. DOUBLE-CHECK EACH IN-TEXT CITATION AGAINST ITS CORRESPONDING BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRY FOR UNIFORMITY.

OMISSION OF KEY INFORMATION

KEY DETAILS, SUCH AS THE YEAR OF PUBLICATION OR THE AUTHOR'S NAME, CAN SOMETIMES BE INADVERTENTLY OMITTED. THIS SIGNIFICANTLY HINDERS THE READER'S ABILITY TO LOCATE THE ORIGINAL SOURCE.

ALWAYS REVIEW YOUR IN-TEXT CITATIONS AND BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRIES TO ENSURE THAT ALL REQUIRED COMPONENTS—AUTHOR, YEAR, TITLE, AND PUBLICATION DETAILS—ARE PRESENT AND ACCURATE.

MISATTRIBUTING DATA ORIGIN

A CRITICAL ERROR IS MISATTRIBUTING THE ORIGIN OF THE DATA. THIS CAN HAPPEN WHEN A CHART IS ADAPTED OR MODIFIED WITHOUT CLEAR ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF THE ORIGINAL SOURCE OR WHEN SECONDARY SOURCES ARE CITED WITHOUT VERIFYING THE PRIMARY SOURCE OF THE DATA.

ALWAYS STRIVE TO CITE THE PRIMARY SOURCE OF THE DATA WHENEVER POSSIBLE. IF YOU ARE ADAPTING A CHART FROM ANOTHER SOURCE, CLEARLY STATE THAT IT IS AN ADAPTATION AND CITE BOTH THE ORIGINAL SOURCE AND THE SOURCE FROM WHICH YOU OBTAINED THE ADAPTED CHART.

IMPROPER HANDLING OF FIGURES AND TABLES

INCORRECTLY NUMBERING, TITLING, OR CAPTIONING FIGURES AND TABLES CAN CREATE CONFUSION. WITHOUT CLEAR LABELS, READERS MAY STRUGGLE TO CONNECT THE TEXT TO THE VISUAL DATA.

FOLLOW A SYSTEMATIC APPROACH TO NUMBERING AND TITLING. ENSURE THAT EACH CAPTION ACCURATELY DESCRIBES THE CONTENT AND INCLUDES THE CORRECT IN-TEXT CITATION.

BEST PRACTICES FOR EFFECTIVE CHART CITATION

ADHERING TO BEST PRACTICES IN CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE CHART CITATION NOT ONLY ENSURES COMPLIANCE BUT ALSO ENHANCES THE CLARITY, CREDIBILITY, AND PROFESSIONALISM OF YOUR WORK.

PRIORITIZE PRIMARY SOURCES

WHenever possible, cite the primary source of the data for your charts. This ensures the most accurate and direct attribution. Relying on secondary sources for charts can introduce errors or a lack of essential detail.

BE CONSISTENT AND METICULOUS

Consistency in your citation style is paramount. Ensure that every in-text citation has a corresponding bibliography entry, and that the formatting, punctuation, and information are identical in both. Meticulously check all details, including author names, dates, titles, and page numbers, before finalizing your work.

USE CLEAR AND DESCRIPTIVE CAPTIONS

Your chart captions should be concise yet informative. They should clearly explain what the chart represents and provide the necessary in-text citation. This direct linkage is crucial for reader comprehension and source verification.

UNDERSTAND THE NUANCES OF DIFFERENT SOURCE TYPES

Be aware that citing charts from books, journals, websites, or reports may require slight variations in format. Familiarize yourself with the specific Chicago Manual of Style guidelines for each type of source to ensure accuracy.

REVIEW AND PROOFREAD CAREFULLY

Before submitting your work, dedicate time to thoroughly reviewing all your citations. A fresh pair of eyes can often catch errors that you might have overlooked. Pay close attention to the interplay between your text, your charts, and your citations.

FAQ

Q: WHAT IS THE PRIMARY DIFFERENCE BETWEEN CITING A CHART AND CITING A TEXT IN CHICAGO STYLE AUTHOR-DATE?

A: The primary difference lies in how the specific element is referenced. While text citations point to authors and publication years, chart citations, especially within a document, often require additional details like figure numbers or table titles within the caption and the bibliography entry to pinpoint the visual data accurately.

Q: DO I NEED TO CITE A CHART IF I CREATED IT MYSELF USING DATA FROM A PUBLISHED SOURCE?

A: Yes, even if you created the chart, you must cite the original source of the data. Your caption should indicate that the chart is based on data from a specific source, and the bibliography entry will point to that

SOURCE. YOU MIGHT ALSO NOTE THAT THE CHART WAS "ADAPTED BY THE AUTHOR" OR "COMPILED BY THE AUTHOR" IF YOU SIGNIFICANTLY ALTERED ITS PRESENTATION.

Q: HOW DO I CITE A CHART THAT APPEARS IN AN ONLINE REPORT WITH NO CLEAR AUTHOR LISTED?

A: IF NO INDIVIDUAL AUTHOR IS LISTED FOR AN ONLINE REPORT, YOU WOULD TYPICALLY USE THE NAME OF THE ORGANIZATION RESPONSIBLE FOR THE REPORT AS THE AUTHOR. THE YEAR OF PUBLICATION OR LAST UPDATE, THE TITLE OF THE REPORT, AND THE URL WITH AN ACCESS DATE WOULD THEN FOLLOW IN THE BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRY.

Q: SHOULD I INCLUDE PAGE NUMBERS FOR CHARTS CITED IN-TEXT IF THE CHART IS A STANDALONE FIGURE?

A: GENERALLY, IF THE CHART IS PRESENTED AS A DISTINCT FIGURE WITHIN YOUR DOCUMENT AND IS CLEARLY NUMBERED AND TITLED, A PAGE NUMBER MIGHT NOT BE STRICTLY NECESSARY IN THE IN-TEXT CITATION, AS THE FIGURE NUMBER SERVES AS A LOCATOR. HOWEVER, IF THE CHART IS EMBEDDED WITHIN A TEXT BLOCK ON A SPECIFIC PAGE AND YOU ARE REFERENCING THAT SPECIFIC INSTANCE, INCLUDING THE PAGE NUMBER IS ADVISABLE. ALWAYS REFER TO THE SPECIFIC EDITION OF THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE YOU ARE USING FOR DEFINITIVE GUIDANCE.

Q: WHAT IF A CHART HAS BOTH AN INDIVIDUAL AUTHOR AND AN ORGANIZATIONAL AUTHOR LISTED?

A: IN SUCH CASES, CHICAGO STYLE GENERALLY PRIORITIZES THE INDIVIDUAL AUTHOR. IF THE INDIVIDUAL AUTHOR IS CLEARLY RESPONSIBLE FOR THE CONTENT OF THE CHART AND ITS ANALYSIS, THEY WOULD BE LISTED AS THE PRIMARY AUTHOR IN THE CITATION. THE ORGANIZATION MAY BE MENTIONED IN THE PUBLICATION DETAILS OF THE SOURCE.

Q: HOW DO I HANDLE CHARTS THAT ARE DYNAMIC OR INTERACTIVE ON A WEBSITE?

A: FOR DYNAMIC OR INTERACTIVE CHARTS, CITE THEM AS YOU WOULD ANY OTHER WEB CONTENT, PROVIDING THE AUTHOR (INDIVIDUAL OR ORGANIZATION), YEAR, TITLE OF THE PAGE OR CHART, WEBSITE NAME, AND URL. IF THE INTERACTIVITY IS CRUCIAL TO THE INFORMATION CONVEYED AND CANNOT BE FULLY CAPTURED, CONSIDER DESCRIBING ITS NATURE BRIEFLY IN YOUR TEXT, IN ADDITION TO PROVIDING THE CITATION. AN ACCESS DATE IS ALSO IMPORTANT AS WEB CONTENT CAN CHANGE.

Q: WHEN IS IT APPROPRIATE TO INCLUDE A DESCRIPTION OF THE CHART IN THE CAPTION BEFORE THE CITATION?

A: IT IS ALWAYS APPROPRIATE TO PROVIDE A BRIEF DESCRIPTIVE CAPTION FOR YOUR CHARTS, EXPLAINING WHAT THEY ILLUSTRATE. THIS DESCRIPTION SHOULD PRECEDE THE IN-TEXT CITATION. THE CAPTION'S PURPOSE IS TO INTRODUCE THE VISUAL ELEMENT AND THEN ATTRIBUTE IT TO ITS SOURCE, MAKING THE ENTIRE PRESENTATION CLEAR AND UNDERSTANDABLE FOR THE READER.
