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## UNDERSTANDING THE CHICAGO AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM

THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE (CMOS) OFFERS TWO DISTINCT SYSTEMS FOR CITATION: NOTES AND BIBLIOGRAPHY, AND AUTHOR-DATE. THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM, AS ITS NAME SUGGESTS, PRIORITIZES BREVITY AND DIRECTNESS WITHIN THE TEXT ITSELF. INSTEAD OF LENGTHY FOOTNOTES OR ENDNOTES, IT PROVIDES ESSENTIAL SOURCE INFORMATION—THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME AND THE PUBLICATION YEAR—IMMEDIATELY FOLLOWING THE BORROWED MATERIAL. THIS METHOD IS PARTICULARLY FAVORED IN FIELDS WHERE RESEARCH IS ITERATIVE AND FREQUENTLY REFERS BACK TO SPECIFIC STUDIES AND THEIR PUBLICATION DATES, MAKING IT EASIER FOR READERS TO QUICKLY LOCATE THE ORIGINAL SOURCE IF NEEDED. THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM REQUIRES A CORRESPONDING LIST OF ALL CITED SOURCES AT THE END OF THE DOCUMENT, KNOWN AS THE REFERENCE LIST, WHICH PROVIDES THE COMPLETE BIBLIOGRAPHIC DETAILS.

THE PRIMARY GOAL OF ANY CITATION STYLE, INCLUDING CHICAGO AUTHOR-DATE, IS TO GIVE CREDIT WHERE CREDIT IS DUE AND TO ALLOW READERS TO VERIFY THE INFORMATION PRESENTED. BY CONSISTENTLY APPLYING THE AUTHOR-DATE FORMAT, WRITERS DEMONSTRATE THEIR ENGAGEMENT WITH SCHOLARLY LITERATURE AND CONTRIBUTE TO THE ACADEMIC DISCOURSE ETHICALLY. THIS SYSTEM EMPHASIZES TRANSPARENCY AND ACADEMIC INTEGRITY, FORMING THE BEDROCK OF RELIABLE RESEARCH COMMUNICATION. IT STREAMLINES THE CITATION PROCESS FOR BOTH THE WRITER AND THE READER, OFFERING A CLEAR AND EFFICIENT WAY TO TRACK THE ORIGIN OF IDEAS AND INFORMATION WITHIN AN ACADEMIC PAPER.

## COMPONENTS OF AN AUTHOR-DATE CITATION

AT ITS CORE, THE CHICAGO AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM RELIES ON TWO PRIMARY COMPONENTS TO IDENTIFY A SOURCE: THE AUTHOR AND THE DATE OF PUBLICATION. THESE ELEMENTS ARE USED FOR THE IN-TEXT CITATIONS AND ARE THE FOUNDATIONAL PIECES OF INFORMATION THAT WILL BE EXPANDED UPON IN THE REFERENCE LIST. WHEN CITING A SOURCE, THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME IS PARAMOUNT, FOLLOWED BY THE YEAR THE WORK WAS PUBLISHED. THIS PAIRING ALLOWS FOR IMMEDIATE IDENTIFICATION OF THE SOURCE WITHIN THE FLOW OF THE TEXT.

BEYOND THESE CORE ELEMENTS, THE REFERENCE LIST PROVIDES THE COMPREHENSIVE DETAILS NECESSARY FOR A READER TO LOCATE THE ORIGINAL SOURCE. THIS INCLUDES THE FULL TITLE OF THE WORK, PUBLICATION INFORMATION (SUCH AS THE PUBLISHER FOR BOOKS OR THE JOURNAL NAME, VOLUME, AND ISSUE FOR ARTICLES), AND PAGE NUMBERS WHERE APPLICABLE. EACH PIECE OF INFORMATION SERVES A DISTINCT PURPOSE IN RECONSTRUCTING THE FULL BIBLIOGRAPHIC RECORD OF THE CITED MATERIAL, ENSURING THAT READERS HAVE ALL THE NECESSARY TOOLS FOR FURTHER INVESTIGATION OR VERIFICATION.

## AUTHOR'S LAST NAME

THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME IS THE FIRST AND MOST CRITICAL PIECE OF INFORMATION IN BOTH IN-TEXT CITATIONS AND THE REFERENCE LIST. WHEN CITING AN AUTHOR, IT IS ALWAYS THEIR LAST NAME THAT IS USED. THIS CONVENTION HELPS TO QUICKLY DIFFERENTIATE BETWEEN AUTHORS, ESPECIALLY WHEN MULTIPLE INDIVIDUALS MAY HAVE PUBLISHED WORKS ON SIMILAR TOPICS. FOR WORKS WITH MULTIPLE AUTHORS, SPECIFIC RULES APPLY, WHICH WILL BE DETAILED LATER IN THIS GUIDE.

FOR DIRECT QUOTATIONS OR PARAPHRASED IDEAS, THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME WILL BE DIRECTLY LINKED TO THE YEAR OF PUBLICATION. IN THE REFERENCE LIST, THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME ALSO APPEARS FIRST, FOLLOWED BY THEIR FIRST NAME OR INITIAL, TO PROVIDE COMPLETE IDENTIFICATION. THIS CONSISTENT PLACEMENT ENSURES THAT READERS CAN EASILY MATCH IN-TEXT CITATIONS TO THEIR FULL ENTRIES IN THE REFERENCE LIST.

## PUBLICATION YEAR

THE PUBLICATION YEAR IS THE SECOND ESSENTIAL COMPONENT OF THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM. IT PROVIDES CRUCIAL TEMPORAL CONTEXT FOR THE INFORMATION BEING CITED. KNOWING WHEN A WORK WAS PUBLISHED HELPS READERS UNDERSTAND ITS PLACE WITHIN THE SCHOLARLY CONVERSATION, ITS POTENTIAL RELEVANCE, AND WHETHER MORE RECENT RESEARCH MIGHT HAVE SUPERSEDED ITS FINDINGS.

IN IN-TEXT CITATIONS, THE PUBLICATION YEAR IMMEDIATELY FOLLOWS THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME, ENCLOSED IN PARENTHESES. FOR EXAMPLE, (SMITH 2020). IN THE REFERENCE LIST, THE YEAR ALSO FOLLOWS THE AUTHOR'S NAME, PROVIDING ANOTHER CLEAR POINT OF REFERENCE FOR LOCATING THE ENTRY. THIS CONSISTENT PAIRING REINFORCES THE CONNECTION BETWEEN THE IN-TEXT CITATION AND ITS FULL BIBLIOGRAPHIC DESCRIPTION.

## IN-TEXT CITATIONS IN CHICAGO STYLE

IN-TEXT CITATIONS ARE THE BACKBONE OF THE CHICAGO AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM, SERVING AS BRIEF REFERENCES EMBEDDED DIRECTLY WITHIN YOUR ESSAY'S TEXT. THEY ALERT YOUR READER TO THE FACT THAT YOU ARE USING INFORMATION FROM AN EXTERNAL SOURCE AND PROVIDE THE IMMEDIATE KEY TO IDENTIFY THAT SOURCE. THESE CITATIONS ARE TYPICALLY PLACED AT THE END OF A SENTENCE OR CLAUSE WHERE THE BORROWED MATERIAL APPEARS, THOUGH THEY CAN ALSO BE INTEGRATED MORE FLUIDLY INTO THE SENTENCE STRUCTURE.

THE PRIMARY FUNCTION OF IN-TEXT CITATIONS IS TO GIVE CREDIT TO THE ORIGINAL AUTHOR AND TO AVOID PLAGIARISM. THEY ALSO GUIDE YOUR READER TO THE FULL CITATION INFORMATION FOUND IN THE REFERENCE LIST AT THE END OF YOUR PAPER. PROPER PLACEMENT AND FORMATTING OF THESE CITATIONS ARE ESSENTIAL FOR CLARITY AND ACADEMIC INTEGRITY.

## BASIC IN-TEXT CITATION FORMAT

THE MOST FUNDAMENTAL FORM OF AN IN-TEXT CITATION IN CHICAGO AUTHOR-DATE STYLE INCLUDES THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME AND THE YEAR OF PUBLICATION, ENCLOSED IN PARENTHESES. THIS IS USUALLY PLACED AFTER THE QUOTED OR PARAPHRASED MATERIAL. FOR INSTANCE, IF YOU ARE CITING A CONCEPT FROM A WORK BY JOHN DOE PUBLISHED IN 2022, THE CITATION WOULD APPEAR AS (DOE 2022).

WHEN YOU MENTION THE AUTHOR'S NAME IN THE SENTENCE ITSELF, YOU CAN OMIT IT FROM THE PARENTHESES. FOR EXAMPLE, "AS DOE (2022) ARGUES, THE ECONOMIC IMPACT WAS SIGNIFICANT." IN THIS CASE, ONLY THE YEAR IS NECESSARY WITHIN THE PARENTHESES. THIS FLEXIBILITY ALLOWS FOR SMOOTHER PROSE WHILE STILL PROVIDING CLEAR ATTRIBUTION.

## CITING SPECIFIC PAGES

FOR DIRECT QUOTATIONS, IT IS IMPERATIVE TO INCLUDE THE PAGE NUMBER(S) FROM WHICH THE MATERIAL WAS TAKEN. THIS

ALLOWS READERS TO LOCATE THE EXACT PASSAGE YOU ARE REFERENCING. THE PAGE NUMBER IS ADDED AFTER THE PUBLICATION YEAR, SEPARATED BY A COLON. FOR EXAMPLE, (DOE 2022, 115). IF THE QUOTATION SPANS MULTIPLE PAGES, USE A HYPHEN: (DOE 2022, 115–17).

WHEN PARAPHRASING OR SUMMARIZING INFORMATION THAT IS NOT DIRECTLY QUOTED BUT IS DERIVED FROM A SPECIFIC SECTION OF A SOURCE, IT IS ALSO GOOD PRACTICE TO INCLUDE THE PAGE NUMBER(S). THIS IS ESPECIALLY HELPFUL IF THE SOURCE IS LENGTHY OR IF THE IDEA IS PRESENTED WITHIN A PARTICULAR CHAPTER OR SECTION. FOR EXAMPLE, (DOE 2022, 115).

## MULTIPLE AUTHORS

CITING WORKS WITH MULTIPLE AUTHORS REQUIRES SPECIFIC FORMATTING DEPENDING ON THE NUMBER OF AUTHORS. FOR WORKS WITH TWO AUTHORS, BOTH LAST NAMES ARE INCLUDED, SEPARATED BY "AND." FOR EXAMPLE, (SMITH AND JONES 2021).

FOR WORKS WITH THREE OR MORE AUTHORS, ONLY THE FIRST AUTHOR'S LAST NAME IS LISTED, FOLLOWED BY "ET AL." (WHICH IS LATIN FOR "AND OTHERS"). FOR EXAMPLE, (ADAMS ET AL. 2019). THIS HELPS KEEP IN-TEXT CITATIONS CONCISE, ESPECIALLY WHEN DEALING WITH COLLABORATIVE RESEARCH. THE REFERENCE LIST WILL PROVIDE THE FULL LIST OF AUTHORS FOR SUCH WORKS.

## CRAFTING THE REFERENCE LIST

THE REFERENCE LIST, ALSO KNOWN AS THE BIBLIOGRAPHY IN SOME CONTEXTS, IS A CRUCIAL COMPANION TO YOUR IN-TEXT CITATIONS. IT PROVIDES THE COMPLETE BIBLIOGRAPHIC INFORMATION FOR EVERY SOURCE YOU HAVE CITED IN YOUR ESSAY, ALLOWING YOUR READERS TO FIND AND CONSULT THESE SOURCES THEMSELVES. EACH ENTRY IN THE REFERENCE LIST CORRESPONDS TO AN IN-TEXT CITATION AND MUST BE FORMATTED PRECISELY ACCORDING TO CHICAGO AUTHOR-DATE GUIDELINES.

THE REFERENCE LIST SHOULD BE ALPHABETIZED BY THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME. IF YOU HAVE MULTIPLE WORKS BY THE SAME AUTHOR, THEY SHOULD BE LISTED CHRONOLOGICALLY BY YEAR OF PUBLICATION, WITH THE EARLIEST WORK APPEARING FIRST. THIS ORGANIZATION ENSURES THAT READERS CAN QUICKLY LOCATE THE SPECIFIC SOURCE THEY ARE LOOKING FOR.

## BOOK CITATIONS

WHEN CITING A BOOK, THE REFERENCE LIST ENTRY TYPICALLY INCLUDES THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME, FIRST INITIAL, PUBLICATION YEAR, THE FULL TITLE OF THE BOOK (ITALICIZED), AND THE PLACE OF PUBLICATION. FOR EXAMPLE:

DOE, JOHN. 2022. *THEORIES OF MODERN ECONOMICS*. NEW YORK: OXFORD UNIVERSITY PRESS.

IF THE BOOK HAS MULTIPLE EDITIONS, THE EDITION NUMBER SHOULD BE INCLUDED AFTER THE TITLE. FOR EXAMPLE:

SMITH, JANE. 2020. *INTRODUCTION TO SOCIOLOGY*. 3RD ED. CHICAGO: UNIVERSITY OF CHICAGO PRESS.

## JOURNAL ARTICLE CITATIONS

CITING JOURNAL ARTICLES REQUIRES INFORMATION ABOUT THE AUTHOR(S), YEAR OF PUBLICATION, ARTICLE TITLE, JOURNAL TITLE (ITALICIZED), VOLUME NUMBER, ISSUE NUMBER, AND PAGE NUMBERS. FOR EXAMPLE:

JOHNSON, ROBERT. 2023. "THE IMPACT OF SOCIAL MEDIA ON POLITICAL DISCOURSE." *JOURNAL OF COMMUNICATION STUDIES* 45, no. 2: 180–95.

THE VOLUME AND ISSUE NUMBERS ARE USUALLY NOT ITALICIZED. THE JOURNAL TITLE IS ITALICIZED, FOLLOWED BY THE VOLUME NUMBER, THE ISSUE NUMBER IN PARENTHESES, AND THEN THE PAGE RANGE.

## ONLINE SOURCES

CITING ONLINE SOURCES REQUIRES CAREFUL ATTENTION TO DETAIL TO ENSURE THAT READERS CAN ACCESS THE MATERIAL. THIS TYPICALLY INCLUDES THE AUTHOR'S NAME, PUBLICATION YEAR, THE TITLE OF THE WEBPAGE OR DOCUMENT, THE WEBSITE NAME, AND A STABLE URL. FOR SOURCES WITHOUT A SPECIFIC PUBLICATION DATE, USE "N.D." FOR "NO DATE."

IF A RETRIEVAL DATE IS NECESSARY BECAUSE THE CONTENT IS LIKELY TO CHANGE, IT SHOULD BE INCLUDED.

## COMMON CITATION SCENARIOS

NAVIGATING THE NUANCES OF ACADEMIC WRITING OFTEN INVOLVES ENCOUNTERING VARIOUS SOURCE TYPES AND SITUATIONS THAT REQUIRE SPECIFIC CITATION TREATMENTS. THE CHICAGO AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM PROVIDES CLEAR GUIDELINES FOR THESE COMMON SCENARIOS, ENSURING CONSISTENCY AND ACCURACY IN YOUR ACADEMIC WORK. UNDERSTANDING THESE SPECIFIC FORMATS IS KEY TO MAINTAINING THE INTEGRITY OF YOUR RESEARCH.

### EDITED VOLUMES

WHEN CITING A CHAPTER OR ESSAY WITHIN AN EDITED VOLUME (A COLLECTION OF WORKS BY DIFFERENT AUTHORS COMPILED BY AN EDITOR), YOU CITE THE AUTHOR OF THE SPECIFIC CHAPTER, THE YEAR OF PUBLICATION OF THE VOLUME, THE TITLE OF THE CHAPTER, AND THEN INFORMATION ABOUT THE EDITOR AND THE OVERALL VOLUME. FOR EXAMPLE:

MILLER, SARAH. 2019. "THE RENAISSANCE ART MOVEMENT." IN *A HISTORY OF WESTERN ART*, EDITED BY DAVID LEE, 150-75. LONDON: ART HISTORY PRESS.

THE CHAPTER TITLE IS NOT ITALICIZED, BUT THE TITLE OF THE EDITED VOLUME IS.

### WORKS WITH NO AUTHOR

IF A WORK HAS NO DISCERNIBLE AUTHOR, YOU TYPICALLY BEGIN THE CITATION WITH THE TITLE OF THE WORK. IF THE WORK IS A STANDALONE PUBLICATION LIKE A BOOK, THE TITLE IS ITALICIZED. IF IT'S A CHAPTER OR ARTICLE, IT IS NOT.

THE UNOFFICIAL GUIDE TO ACADEMIC WRITING. 2020. NEW YORK: FICTIONAL PUBLISHERS.

FOR ONLINE ARTICLES WITHOUT AN AUTHOR, YOU MIGHT START WITH THE ARTICLE TITLE.

### WORKS WITH CORPORATE AUTHORS

WHEN AN ORGANIZATION, GOVERNMENT AGENCY, OR OTHER CORPORATE BODY IS THE AUTHOR OF A WORK, USE THE NAME OF THE ORGANIZATION AS THE AUTHOR. FOR EXAMPLE:

WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION. 2021. *GLOBAL HEALTH REPORT 2021*. GENEVA: WHO PRESS.

THIS ENSURES THAT THE SOURCE IS CLEARLY ATTRIBUTED TO THE RESPONSIBLE ENTITY.

# SPECIAL CASES AND ADVANCED TIPS

BEYOND THE STANDARD FORMATS, THE CHICAGO AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM OFFERS GUIDANCE FOR MORE COMPLEX CITATION NEEDS. FAMILIARIZING YOURSELF WITH THESE SPECIAL CASES CAN HELP YOU ADDRESS THE UNIQUE CHALLENGES OF CITING DIVERSE SOURCE MATERIALS ACCURATELY. ATTENTION TO DETAIL IN THESE AREAS IS A HALLMARK OF PROFESSIONAL ACADEMIC WRITING.

## CITING MULTIPLE WORKS BY THE SAME AUTHOR IN THE SAME YEAR

IF AN AUTHOR HAS PUBLISHED MULTIPLE WORKS IN THE SAME YEAR, YOU DISTINGUISH THEM BY ADDING LOWERCASE LETTERS TO THE YEAR IN BOTH THE IN-TEXT CITATION AND THE REFERENCE LIST. FOR EXAMPLE, IF AN AUTHOR PUBLISHED TWO WORKS IN 2023, THEY WOULD BE CITED AS (SMITH 2023A) AND (SMITH 2023B). IN THE REFERENCE LIST, THESE WOULD APPEAR AS SMITH 2023A AND SMITH 2023B, AND THE ORDER WOULD BE DETERMINED ALPHABETICALLY BY THE TITLE OF THE WORK.

## ELECTRONIC SOURCES WITH NO PAGE NUMBERS

FOR ELECTRONIC SOURCES THAT DO NOT HAVE PAGE NUMBERS (SUCH AS MANY WEBSITES OR ONLINE JOURNAL ARTICLES WITHOUT PAGINATION), YOU CAN USE PARAGRAPH NUMBERS IF AVAILABLE, OR SECTION HEADINGS. IF NEITHER IS CLEARLY IDENTIFIABLE, YOU MIGHT OMIT PAGE NUMBERS ALTOGETHER, RELYING ON THE URL FOR LOCATION. HOWEVER, IT IS ALWAYS BEST TO CONSULT THE LATEST EDITION OF THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE FOR THE MOST UP-TO-DATE RECOMMENDATIONS ON THESE EVOLVING FORMATS.

## INTERVIEWS AND PERSONAL COMMUNICATIONS

WHILE INTERVIEWS AND PERSONAL COMMUNICATIONS ARE NOT TYPICALLY INCLUDED IN THE REFERENCE LIST BECAUSE THEY ARE NOT RETRIEVABLE BY THE GENERAL READER, THEY MUST BE CITED IN THE TEXT. YOU SHOULD INDICATE THE TYPE OF COMMUNICATION, THE PERSON INTERVIEWED OR COMMUNICATED WITH, AND THE DATE. FOR EXAMPLE: (JANE DOE, INTERVIEW BY AUTHOR, OCTOBER 20, 2023).

IMPLEMENTING THE CHICAGO AUTHOR-DATE STYLE REQUIRES CAREFUL ATTENTION TO DETAIL AND CONSISTENT APPLICATION OF ITS RULES. BY UNDERSTANDING THE CORE COMPONENTS, MASTERING IN-TEXT CITATIONS, AND ACCURATELY CONSTRUCTING YOUR REFERENCE LIST, YOU CAN ENSURE THAT YOUR ACADEMIC WORK IS PROPERLY ATTRIBUTED, ETHICALLY SOUND, AND EASILY NAVIGABLE FOR YOUR READERS. THIS SYSTEM, WHILE DEMANDING PRECISION, ULTIMATELY ENHANCES THE CREDIBILITY AND CLARITY OF YOUR SCHOLARSHIP.

## FAQ

### Q: WHAT IS THE MAIN DIFFERENCE BETWEEN CHICAGO AUTHOR-DATE AND NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY STYLE?

A: THE PRIMARY DIFFERENCE LIES IN HOW SOURCES ARE CITED WITHIN THE TEXT. THE CHICAGO AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM USES PARENTHETICAL IN-TEXT CITATIONS (AUTHOR, YEAR, PAGE NUMBER), WHILE THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY STYLE USES FOOTNOTES OR ENDNOTES FOR CITATIONS. THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM ALSO REQUIRES A REFERENCE LIST, WHEREAS NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY USES A BIBLIOGRAPHY.

### Q: WHEN SHOULD I USE THE CHICAGO AUTHOR-DATE CITATION STYLE FOR MY ESSAY?

A: THE CHICAGO AUTHOR-DATE STYLE IS COMMONLY USED IN THE SOCIAL SCIENCES, HISTORY, AND SOME SCIENTIFIC

DISCIPLINES. CONSULT YOUR PROFESSOR OR INSTRUCTOR TO DETERMINE WHICH CITATION STYLE IS REQUIRED FOR YOUR SPECIFIC ESSAY OR COURSE.

## **Q: How do I cite a source that has no publication date in Chicago author-date style?**

A: For sources without a publication date, you should use "n.d." (which stands for "no date") in place of the year in both the in-text citation and the reference list entry. For example: (Smith n.d.) or Smith, John. n.d. Title of Work.

## **Q: What is the correct way to format an in-text citation for a direct quote in Chicago author-date style?**

A: For a direct quote, you must include the author's last name, the publication year, and the page number(s) where the quote appears, all enclosed in parentheses. For example: (Doe 2022, 115). If the author's name is mentioned in the text, only the year and page number are needed in parentheses: Doe (2022, 115) stated that...

## **Q: How do I alphabetize entries in my Chicago author-date reference list?**

A: Entries in the reference list are alphabetized by the author's last name. If there are multiple works by the same author, they are arranged chronologically by publication year, from earliest to latest. If there are multiple works by the same author in the same year, they are further distinguished by adding lowercase letters to the year (e.g., 2023a, 2023b).

## **Q: What information is essential for citing a journal article in Chicago author-date style?**

A: For a journal article, you need the author's full name, the publication year, the article title, the journal title (italicized), the volume number, the issue number, and the page range of the article. For example: Johnson, Robert. 2023. "The Impact of Social Media on Political Discourse." *Journal of Communication Studies* 45, no. 2: 180-95.

## **Q: How should I cite a book with an editor instead of an author?**

A: When citing a book with an editor, the editor's name appears in place of the author at the beginning of the reference list entry, preceded by "ed." or "eds." For an in-text citation, you would use the editor's last name and the year. For example, in the reference list: Lee, David, ed. 2019. *A History of Western Art*. London: Art History Press. In-text: (Lee 2019).
