- **Newspaper Name:** *Chicago Sun-Times*. The name of the newspaper is italicized.
- **Publication Date:** October 26. The full date, including month and day, is provided.

Handling Articles Without a Byline

If an article lacks an author, the newspaper name begins the entry, and the year follows. The title then appears in quotation marks, followed by the newspaper name (again, italicized), the date, and the URL.

Example:

When the Newspaper is Primarily Online

For publications that are exclusively online and function as newspapers, the same citation format applies. The key is to identify the publication as a newspaper or a news source functioning as one.

Handling Specific Scenarios

No Date Provided

If, in the rare case, an online newspaper article provides no publication date whatsoever, you should use "n.d." (for no date) in place of the year in both the in-text citation and the reference list entry. For example, the in-text citation would be (Smith n.d.), and the reference list entry would be Smith, Jane. n.d. "Article Title." *Newspaper Name*, Month Day. URL.

Shortened Newspaper Names

Some major newspapers are commonly referred to by shortened names (e.g., "NYT" for The New York Times). However, in formal citations, it is always best to use the full, official name of the publication unless the newspaper itself consistently uses a shortened form as its primary identifier.
