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UNDERSTANDING CHICAGO STYLE FOR BLOGS

THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE (CMOS) OFFERS A ROBUST FRAMEWORK FOR ACADEMIC AND PROFESSIONAL WRITING, INCLUDING THE CITATION OF DIGITAL SOURCES. WHEN IT COMES TO BLOGS, CMOS RECOGNIZES THEIR EVOLVING NATURE AS A SOURCE OF INFORMATION, COMMENTARY, AND OPINION. THE KEY IS TO TREAT A BLOG POST LIKE ANY OTHER PUBLISHED WORK, CAPTURING ITS ESSENTIAL BIBLIOGRAPHIC DETAILS TO ALLOW READERS TO LOCATE THE ORIGINAL MATERIAL.

CHICAGO STYLE, UNLIKE SOME OTHER CITATION SYSTEMS, PROVIDES FLEXIBILITY IN ITS APPROACH, PARTICULARLY WITH THE DISTINCTION BETWEEN AUTHOR-DATE AND NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEMS. ESSENTIAL COMPONENTS OF A CHICAGO STYLE BLOG CITATION

REGARDLESS OF WHETHER YOU ARE USING THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY OR AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM, CERTAIN CORE PIECES OF INFORMATION ARE CRUCIAL FOR A CHICAGO STYLE BLOG CITATION. THESE COMPONENTS HELP TO UNIQUELY IDENTIFY THE SOURCE AND PROVIDE ENOUGH DETAIL FOR YOUR READER TO FIND IT. THE SPECIFIC ORDER AND PUNCTUATION WILL VARY SLIGHTLY BETWEEN IN-TEXT CITATIONS AND BIBLIOGRAPHICAL ENTRIES, BUT THE INFORMATION ITSELF REMAINS CONSTANT.

AUTHOR INFORMATION

THE AUTHOR'S NAME IS PARAMOUNT. FOR BLOGS, THIS CAN BE AN INDIVIDUAL'S NAME OR, IN SOME CASES, A PSEUDONYM OR ORGANIZATIONAL NAME IF A PERSONAL NAME IS NOT READILY AVAILABLE OR USED BY THE AUTHOR.

TITLE OF THE BLOG POST

THE SPECIFIC TITLE OF THE BLOG POST YOU ARE REFERENCING IS ESSENTIAL. THIS SHOULD BE ENCLOSED IN QUOTATION MARKS FOR INDIVIDUAL BLOG POSTS.

NAME OF THE BLOG

THIS REFERS TO THE OVERALL TITLE OF THE BLOG ITSELF. IT IS TYPICALLY ITALICIZED IF IT FUNCTIONS AS THE NAME OF A LARGER PUBLICATION OR WEBSITE, OR TREATED AS A COMMON NAME IF IT'S LESS FORMAL.

PUBLICATION DATE

THE DATE THE BLOG POST WAS PUBLISHED IS A CRITICAL PIECE OF INFORMATION. CMOS GENERALLY PREFERS THE FULL DATE (MONTH, DAY, YEAR) IF AVAILABLE, AS IT AIDS IN PINPOINTING THE EXACT VERSION OF THE CONTENT.

URL

THE SPECIFIC WEB ADDRESS (URL) WHERE THE BLOG POST CAN BE ACCESSED IS INDISPENSABLE FOR DIGITAL SOURCES. ENSURE IT IS THE DIRECT LINK TO THE POST ITSELF.

ACCESS DATE (OPTIONAL BUT RECOMMENDED)

WHILE NOT ALWAYS MANDATORY, INCLUDING THE DATE YOU ACCESSED THE BLOG POST CAN BE BENEFICIAL, ESPECIALLY FOR ONLINE CONTENT THAT MIGHT BE UPDATED OR REMOVED. THIS DEMONSTRATES WHEN YOU VIEWED THE SOURCE.

CHICAGO STYLE BLOG CITATION EXAMPLES: IN-TEXT CITATIONS

IN-TEXT CITATIONS IN CHICAGO STYLE SERVE TO BRIEFLY INDICATE THE SOURCE OF INFORMATION WITHIN THE BODY OF YOUR TEXT. THE FORMAT DEPENDS ON WHETHER YOU ARE USING THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM OR THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM. FOR BLOGS, THESE ARE OFTEN SIMPLIFIED VERSIONS OF FULL CITATIONS.

CHICAGO STYLE IN-TEXT CITATIONS: NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM

WHEN USING THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM, IN-TEXT CITATIONS ARE TYPICALLY HANDLED THROUGH FOOTNOTES OR ENDNOTES. A SHORTENED FORM MAY APPEAR IN THE NOTE ITSELF, BUT THE FIRST MENTION OF A SOURCE IN A NOTE WILL USUALLY BE MORE DETAILED. FOR SUBSEQUENT REFERENCES TO THE SAME SOURCE WITHIN THE SAME NOTE, OR IN FOLLOWING NOTES, A SHORTENED FORM IS USED.

IF YOU ARE REFERRING TO THE BLOG POST DIRECTLY IN YOUR PROSE WITHOUT A NUMBERED NOTE, YOU CAN OFTEN MENTION THE AUTHOR AND TITLE BRIEFLY, AND THE FULL CITATION WILL BE IN YOUR BIBLIOGRAPHY.

CHICAGO STYLE IN-TEXT CITATIONS: AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM

THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM REQUIRES A PARENTHETICAL CITATION IN THE TEXT THAT INCLUDES THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME AND THE PUBLICATION YEAR. IF THE POST HAS NO SPECIFIC AUTHOR, YOU MAY USE THE BLOG NAME OR A SHORTENED VERSION OF THE TITLE.

- (SMITH 2023)
- IF NO AUTHOR IS LISTED: (TECH INSIGHTS BLOG 2023)
- IF THE AUTHOR AND YEAR ARE MENTIONED IN THE TEXT, NO PARENTHETICAL CITATION IS NEEDED: "AS JOHN SMITH ARGUED IN 2023..."

CHICAGO STYLE BLOG CITATION EXAMPLES: NOTES AND BIBLIOGRAPHY

THE BIBLIOGRAPHY, OR WORKS CITED LIST, IS A COMPREHENSIVE ALPHABETICAL LIST OF ALL THE SOURCES YOU HAVE REFERENCED IN YOUR PAPER. EACH ENTRY FOR A BLOG POST IN THE BIBLIOGRAPHY SHOULD BE DETAILED ENOUGH FOR YOUR READER TO LOCATE THE SOURCE INDEPENDENTLY.

CHICAGO STYLE BLOG CITATION EXAMPLES: FULL NOTE (FIRST MENTION)

THIS IS THE MOST DETAILED FORM OF CITATION FOR A BLOG POST, TYPICALLY USED FOR THE FIRST MENTION IN A FOOTNOTE OR ENDNOTE.

- 1. AUTHOR'S FULL NAME, "TITLE OF BLOG POST," *NAME OF BLOG*, MONTH DAY, YEAR OF PUBLICATION, URL.
- EXAMPLE: JANE DOE, "SUSTAINABLE URBAN GARDENING TIPS," *GREEN THUMBS GAZETTE*, JULY 22, 2024, [HTTPS://WWW.GREENTHUMBSGAZETTE.COM/SUSTAINABLE-GARDENING-JULY22](https://www.greenthumbsgazette.com/sustainable-gardening-july22).

CHICAGO STYLE BLOG CITATION EXAMPLES: BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRY

THE BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRY IS SIMILAR TO THE FULL NOTE BUT WITH A SLIGHTLY DIFFERENT PUNCTUATION AND FORMAT, NOTABLY WITH THE AUTHOR'S LAST NAME FIRST.

- AUTHOR'S LAST NAME, FIRST NAME. "TITLE OF BLOG POST." *NAME OF BLOG*. MONTH DAY, YEAR OF PUBLICATION. ACCESSED MONTH DAY, YEAR. URL.

- **EXAMPLE:** DOE, JANE. "SUSTAINABLE URBAN GARDENING TIPS." *GREEN THUMBS GAZETTE*. JULY 22, 2024. ACCESSED OCTOBER 26, 2023. [HTTPS://WWW.GREENTHUMBSGAZETTE.COM/SUSTAINABLE-GARDENING-JULY22](https://www.greenthumbsgazette.com/sustainable-gardening-july22).

NOTE THAT THE ACCESS DATE IS OPTIONAL BUT RECOMMENDED FOR ONLINE SOURCES. THE PUBLICATION DATE FORMAT IS MONTH DAY, YEAR.

COMMON SCENARIOS AND VARIATIONS IN CHICAGO STYLE BLOG CITATIONS

BLOGS CAN BE DIVERSE, AND SOMETIMES THE STANDARD CITATION FORMAT NEEDS SLIGHT ADJUSTMENTS TO ACCURATELY REPRESENT THE SOURCE.

BLOG POSTS WITH NO AUTHOR

WHEN A BLOG POST LACKS A NAMED AUTHOR, CHICAGO STYLE SUGGESTS USING THE TITLE OF THE BLOG POST AS THE FIRST ELEMENT IN THE CITATION, FOLLOWED BY THE NAME OF THE BLOG ITSELF.

BLOG POSTS BY AN ORGANIZATION OR GROUP

IF A BLOG POST IS ATTRIBUTED TO AN ORGANIZATION RATHER THAN AN INDIVIDUAL, USE THE ORGANIZATION'S NAME AS THE AUTHOR.

WHILE UNCOMMON FOR ACTIVELY MAINTAINED BLOGS, IF A POST GENUINELY HAS NO DISCERNIBLE PUBLICATION DATE, YOU CAN USE "N.D." (NO DATE).

- **BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRY:** SMITH, JOHN. "A HISTORICAL LOOK AT URBAN DEVELOPMENT." *CITY LORE*. N.D. ACCESSED

CITING A COMMENT ON A BLOG POST

IF YOU ARE CITING A SPECIFIC COMMENT LEFT ON A BLOG POST, THE CITATION BECOMES MORE COMPLEX, REQUIRING DETAILS ABOUT THE COMMENTER, THE COMMENT ITSELF (IF IT HAS A TITLE OR CAN BE SUMMARIZED), AND THE ORIGINAL BLOG POST.

- **BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRY:** COMMENTER'S LAST NAME, FIRST NAME. COMMENT ON "TITLE OF BLOG POST," BY AUTHOR OF BLOG POST. *NAME OF BLOG*, MONTH DAY, YEAR OF BLOG POST. ACCESSED MONTH DAY, YEAR. URL OF BLOG POST.
- **EXAMPLE:** MILLER, SARAH. COMMENT ON "THE ETHICS OF AI ART," BY ALEX CHEN. *CREATIVE COMPUTING QUARTERLY*, APRIL 15, 2023. ACCESSED OCTOBER 26, 2023. [HTTPS://WWW.CREATIVECOMPUTING.COM/AI-ART-ETHICS](https://www.creativecomputing.com/ai-art-ethics).

CITING COMMENTS REQUIRES CAREFUL ATTENTION TO ENSURE YOU ARE PROVIDING ENOUGH INFORMATION FOR THE READER TO FIND THE SPECIFIC INTERACTION.

TIPS FOR ACCURATE CHICAGO STYLE BLOG CITATION

ENSURING ACCURACY IN YOUR CHICAGO STYLE BLOG CITATIONS IS PARAMOUNT FOR ACADEMIC INTEGRITY AND THE CREDIBILITY OF YOUR RESEARCH. BY FOLLOWING THESE BEST PRACTICES, YOU CAN EFFECTIVELY MANAGE AND PRESENT YOUR SOURCES.

- **ALWAYS CHECK FOR THE MOST COMPLETE INFORMATION AVAILABLE:** LOOK FOR THE AUTHOR'S FULL NAME, THE PRECISE TITLE OF THE BLOG POST, THE NAME OF THE BLOG, AND THE MOST SPECIFIC PUBLICATION DATE POSSIBLE.
- **VERIFY THE URL:** ENSURE THAT THE URL IS ACTIVE AND LEADS DIRECTLY TO THE BLOG POST YOU ARE CITING. BROKEN LINKS CAN FRUSTRATE READERS AND UNDERMINE YOUR CREDIBILITY.
- **DISTINGUISH BETWEEN THE BLOG POST TITLE AND THE BLOG NAME:** THE TITLE OF THE POST SHOULD BE IN QUOTATION MARKS, WHILE THE NAME OF THE BLOG ITSELF SHOULD GENERALLY BE ITALICIZED.
- **BE CONSISTENT WITH YOUR CHOSEN SYSTEM:** IF YOU ARE USING THE NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY SYSTEM, STICK TO IT FOR ALL YOUR CITATIONS AND BIBLIOGRAPHY. SIMILARLY, IF YOU OPT FOR THE AUTHOR-DATE SYSTEM, MAINTAIN ITS CONSISTENCY THROUGHOUT YOUR WORK.
- **CONSULT THE LATEST EDITION OF THE CHICAGO MANUAL OF STYLE:** CITATION GUIDELINES CAN EVOLVE. FOR THE MOST ACCURATE AND UP-TO-DATE INFORMATION, ALWAYS REFER TO THE OFFICIAL CMOS PUBLICATION OR A RELIABLE ONLINE RESOURCE THAT ADHERES TO ITS PRINCIPLES.
- **UTILIZE CITATION MANAGEMENT TOOLS WITH CAUTION:** WHILE HELPFUL, CITATION SOFTWARE MAY NOT ALWAYS PERFECTLY HANDLE THE NUANCES OF CITING INFORMAL SOURCES LIKE BLOGS. ALWAYS DOUBLE-CHECK THE OUTPUT AGAINST CMOS GUIDELINES.

FAQ

Q: HOW DO I CITE A BLOG POST WHEN THE AUTHOR USES A PSEUDONYM?

A: IF A BLOG AUTHOR USES A PSEUDONYM, TREAT THE PSEUDONYM AS THEIR REAL NAME FOR CITATION PURPOSES. INCLUDE THE PSEUDONYM IN PLACE OF THE AUTHOR'S REAL NAME IN BOTH IN-TEXT CITATIONS AND BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRIES. FOR EXAMPLE, IN A BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRY: "PSEUDONYM NAME. 'TITLE OF BLOG POST.' *NAME OF BLOG...*"

Q: WHAT IF A BLOG POST HAS MULTIPLE AUTHORS?

A: FOR BLOG POSTS WITH TWO AUTHORS, LIST BOTH NAMES IN THE CITATION, CONNECTED BY "AND." FOR THREE OR MORE AUTHORS, LIST THE FIRST AUTHOR'S NAME FOLLOWED BY "ET AL." IN THE BIBLIOGRAPHY. IN NOTES, YOU CAN GENERALLY LIST ALL AUTHORS IF THERE ARE ONLY A FEW, OR USE "ET AL." IF THERE ARE MANY, DEPENDING ON THE SPECIFIC CHICAGO STYLE VARIATION YOU ARE FOLLOWING (E.G., "AUTHOR-DATE" VS. "NOTES-BIBLIOGRAPHY").

Q: HOW DO I CITE A SERIES OF BLOG POSTS ON THE SAME TOPIC?

A: IF YOU ARE CITING MULTIPLE POSTS FROM A SERIES, CITE EACH POST INDIVIDUALLY IF YOU ARE REFERENCING SPECIFIC CONTENT FROM EACH. IF YOU ARE REFERRING TO THE SERIES GENERALLY, YOU MIGHT CITE THE FIRST POST AND MENTION IT IS PART OF A SERIES, OR CITE THE OVERARCHING SERIES TITLE IF ONE IS GIVEN, THOUGH INDIVIDUAL POST CITATIONS ARE GENERALLY PREFERRED FOR SPECIFICITY.

Q: IS IT NECESSARY TO INCLUDE THE ACCESS DATE FOR BLOG POSTS IN CHICAGO STYLE?

A: WHILE NOT ALWAYS STRICTLY MANDATORY IN EVERY INSTANCE, INCLUDING THE ACCESS DATE FOR BLOG POSTS (AND OTHER ONLINE SOURCES) IS HIGHLY RECOMMENDED BY CHICAGO STYLE. THIS IS BECAUSE ONLINE CONTENT CAN CHANGE OR DISAPPEAR, AND THE ACCESS DATE HELPS READERS UNDERSTAND WHEN YOU VIEWED THE INFORMATION, ADDING A LAYER OF VERIFICATION.

Q: WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE BLOG POST TITLE AND THE BLOG NAME IN A CHICAGO STYLE CITATION?

A: THE BLOG POST TITLE REFERS TO THE SPECIFIC HEADLINE OF THE ARTICLE YOU ARE CITING AND SHOULD BE ENCLOSED IN QUOTATION MARKS. THE NAME OF THE BLOG IS THE OVERALL TITLE OF THE WEBSITE OR PUBLICATION WHERE THE POST APPEARS AND IS TYPICALLY ITALICIZED, FUNCTIONING LIKE THE NAME OF A PERIODICAL.

Q: HOW DO I CITE A PODCAST EPISODE THAT IS ALSO PUBLISHED AS A BLOG POST?

A: IF A PODCAST EPISODE IS TRANSCRIBED AND PUBLISHED AS A BLOG POST, YOU CAN CITE IT AS A BLOG POST. HOWEVER, IF YOU ARE REFERENCING THE AUDIO ITSELF, YOU WOULD CITE IT AS A PODCAST. IF YOU ARE CITING THE BLOG POST VERSION, FOCUS ON THE ELEMENTS OF THE BLOG POST (AUTHOR, TITLE OF POST, BLOG NAME, DATE, URL).

Q: CAN I CITE A BLOG POST FROM A PERSONAL BLOG THAT IS NOT PROFESSIONALLY PUBLISHED?

A: YES, CHICAGO STYLE ALLOWS FOR THE CITATION OF PERSONAL BLOGS, RECOGNIZING THEM AS VALID SOURCES OF INFORMATION AND OPINION. TREAT THEM JUST LIKE ANY OTHER BLOG, ENSURING YOU CAPTURE THE AUTHOR'S NAME (EVEN IF IT'S A PSEUDONYM), THE POST TITLE, THE BLOG NAME, THE PUBLICATION DATE, AND THE URL.

Q: HOW DO I HANDLE A BLOG POST THAT IS UPDATED AFTER ITS ORIGINAL PUBLICATION DATE?

A: IF A BLOG POST HAS BEEN UPDATED, IT IS BEST TO NOTE THIS IF POSSIBLE. INCLUDE THE ORIGINAL PUBLICATION DATE AND, IF THE UPDATE IS SIGNIFICANT AND DOCUMENTED, YOU MIGHT ALSO NOTE THE DATE OF THE REVISION. THE URL SHOULD REMAIN THE SAME. FOR CLARITY, IF THERE'S A SIGNIFICANT REVISION, YOU MIGHT MENTION IT IN YOUR NOTE OR BIBLIOGRAPHY ENTRY.

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
