Websites and Online Sources

Citing online content requires attention to the URL and access date.

In Notes-Bibliography: 1. Author Last Name, Author First Name (if available). "Page Title." Website Name. Last Modified Date (if available). Accessed Month Day, Year. URL.

In Author-Date: Author Last Name, Author First Name (if available). Year. "Page Title." Website Name. Last Modified Date (if available). Accessed Month Day, Year. URL.
