Magazine Article Online (with DOI)

If a magazine article is available online and has a Digital Object Identifier (DOI), this is the preferred method for citation. The DOI is a persistent link that ensures the article can be found even if the original URL changes. The format is similar to the print version, with the addition of the DOI.

Author, A. A. (Year, Month Day). Title of article. *Title of Magazine*, Volume(Issue), pages. DOI

For example:

Lerner, S. (2019, November 15). The future of reusable rockets. *Scientific American*, 321(5), 45-51. <https://doi.org/10.1038/scientificamerican1119-45>

Magazine Article Online (without DOI)

When an online magazine article does not have a DOI, you should provide the URL. Ensure the URL is direct and leads to the article itself, not just the magazine's homepage. The format is as follows:

Author, A. A. (Year, Month Day). Title of article. *Title of Magazine*, Volume(Issue), pages. Retrieved from URL

For example:

Smith, J. (2021, March 10). The impact of remote work on productivity. *Forbes*, 175(2), 10-12. Retrieved from <https://www.forbes.com/sites/janesmith/2021/03/10/remote-work-productivity/>

MLA Style for Citing Magazines

The Modern Language Association (MLA) style is commonly used in the humanities, including English, literature, and languages. MLA emphasizes the author and title of the work, reflecting a tradition of literary scholarship. MLA citations for magazines are designed to be straightforward and informative for literary analysis and humanities research.

Magazine Article in Print

In MLA style, magazine articles in print are cited with the author's name, the article title in quotation marks, the magazine title in italics, followed by the date and page numbers. The format is: Author Last Name, First Name. "Title of Article." *Title of Magazine*, Day Month Year, pp. Page Numbers.

For example:

Roth, Adam. "The Rise of Independent Bookstores." *Publishers Weekly*, 15 Oct. 2022, pp. 22-25.

Magazine Article Online (with DOI)

When citing an online magazine article that has a DOI, MLA requires the DOI to be presented as a URL. The format is: Author Last Name, First Name. "Title of Article." *Title of Magazine*, Day Month Year, DOI.

For example:

Chen, Maya. "AI in Creative Arts." *Wired*, 5 Jan. 2023, doi:10.1038/s41586-023-05745-x.

Magazine Article Online (without DOI)

If an online magazine article lacks a DOI, the URL should be provided. MLA generally omits the "http://" or "https://" from the URL. The format is: Author Last Name, First Name. "Title of Article." *Title of Magazine*, Day Month Year, URL.

For example:

Davis, Emily. "Sustainable Urban Farming." *National Geographic*, 12 Feb. 2023, www.nationalgeographic.com/environment/sustainable-urban-farming.

Chicago Style for Citing Magazines

The Chicago Manual of Style (CMOS) offers two systems: the Notes-Bibliography system and the Author-Date system. The Notes-Bibliography system is prevalent in the humanities, while the Author-Date system is more common in social sciences and sciences. Both systems require specific formats for magazine citations.

Notes-Bibliography System

In the Notes-Bibliography system, citations appear in footnotes or endnotes and then in a bibliography at the end of the paper. For a magazine article in a note, the format is: First Name Last Name, "Title of Article," *Title of Magazine* Volume, no. Issue (Month Year): Page number.

For a bibliography entry:

Last Name, First Name. "Title of Article." *Title of Magazine* Volume, no. Issue (Month Year): Page number.

Example (Note):

1. Robert Johnson, "The Evolution of Electric Vehicles," *Popular Science* 298, no. 3 (March 2023): 55.

Example (Bibliography):

Johnson, Robert. "The Evolution of Electric Vehicles." *Popular Science* 298, no. 3 (March 2023): 55.

Author-Date System

The Author-Date system is more concise for in-text citations, referencing the author and year. The full citation appears in a reference list at the end. For a magazine article, the format in the reference list is: Last Name, First Name. Year. "Title of Article." *Title of Magazine* Volume (Month): Page numbers. URL (if online).

Example (Reference List):

Johnson, Robert. 2023. "The Evolution of Electric Vehicles." *Popular Science* 298 (March): 55. www.popsci.com/electric-vehicles.
