Bibliography Format for Chicago

For online articles:

- Last Name, First Name. "Article Title." *Newspaper Name*, Month Day, Year. Accessed Month Day, Year. URL.

In Chicago style, the newspaper title is italicized, and the article title is in quotation marks. The date format is Month Day, Year.

Author-Date System for Chicago

The author-date system is more common in the sciences and social sciences.

In-Text Citations for Chicago Author-Date

In-text citations include the author's last name and the year of publication, with page numbers if available. For example, (Smith 2023, 14).

Reference List Entries for Chicago Author-Date

The reference list entry is similar to the Notes and Bibliography system but may include additional details for online sources:

- Last Name, First Name. Year. "Article Title." *Newspaper Name*, Month Day. URL.

The newspaper title is italicized, and the article title is in quotation marks. The year is placed immediately after the author's name.
