Frequently Asked Questions

What is a comet made of that kids can understand?

Imagine a giant snowball in space that's not made of snow, but of frozen dust, rocks, and ice! It's like a dirty ice cream cone flying through space.

How can we model a comet at home?

A super fun way is to mix ice, dirt or coffee grounds, and maybe some glitter (for the dust and sparkle!) into a balloon, freeze it, and then carefully cut away the balloon. You'll have your own mini comet!

Why does a comet get a tail?

When a comet gets close to the Sun, the Sun's heat melts the ice. This melted ice and dust turn into a gas and form a beautiful tail that points away from the Sun, like a kite in the wind.

What are some cool materials to use when making a comet model?

You can use water for the ice, soil or even cocoa powder for the dust, and glitter or small pebbles for the rocky bits. Don't forget a little bit of hairspray or clear glue to help hold it together!

Can we make a comet move in our model?

You can pretend your comet model is flying through space by gently pushing it. If you're feeling extra creative, you could even attach it to a string and swing it around, like it's orbiting the Sun!

What happens to the tail of a comet?

The tail is made of gas and dust that are pushed away by the Sun's energy. As the comet gets farther away from the Sun, the tail gets smaller and eventually disappears until the comet gets close to the Sun again.

How big are real comets?

Comets can be small, just a few miles wide, or they can be much, much bigger – some are as wide as a city! Their tails, however, can stretch for millions of miles, longer than the distance from Earth to the Moon.

Why are comets important?

Comets are like time capsules from the early days of our solar system. They carry frozen water and other materials that might have helped bring water to Earth and even helped life get started!

What's the difference between a comet and an asteroid?

Think of a comet as a 'dirty snowball' and an asteroid as a 'space rock.' Comets are mostly made of ice and dust, while asteroids are usually made of rock and metal. Comets also tend to have tails when they get near the Sun, which asteroids don't.
