THIS INVOLVES UNDERSTANDING SUPPLY AND DEMAND DYNAMICS, AS WELL AS MITIGATING THE VOLATILITY THAT CAN ARISE FROM WEATHER EVENTS, GLOBAL PRICE FLUCTUATIONS, OR GEOPOLITICAL ISSUES. HOWEVER, EXCESSIVE PROTECTIONISM CAN LEAD TO HIGHER CONSUMER PRICES, STIFLE INNOVATION, AND INVITE RETALIATORY MEASURES FROM TRADING PARTNERS.

A NUANCED APPROACH OFTEN INVOLVES NEGOTIATING BILATERAL AND MULTILATERAL TRADE AGREEMENTS THAT AIM TO REDUCE BARRIERS WHILE ENSURING THAT SANITARY AND PHYTOSANITARY STANDARDS ARE MET. UNDERSTANDING THE COMPARATIVE ADVANTAGES OF DIFFERENT REGIONS AND PRODUCTS IS KEY TO FOSTERING MUTUALLY BENEFICIAL TRADE RELATIONSHIPS THAT STRENGTHEN THE GLOBAL AGRICULTURAL ECONOMY.

SUBSIDIES AND DIRECT SUPPORT MECHANISMS
